## Introduction

Education is the key to progress and development of nations. It is one of the important indicators of developmental progress, economic growth, scientific innovation and creativity. It effectively contributes to achieving the development goals of the state in general and Abu Dhabi in particular. The impact of education is not limited to improving work productivity but it goes far beyond to deeply impact the quality of life in its broadest sense including the population cultural and social behavior.

The wise cultural vision of our judicious leadership and their future prospects for development, in a way that builds for a promising and prosperous future, made the Emirate of Abu Dhabi pay great attention and devote itself to education as one of the most important established parameters aiming at human development and generation rehabilitation to keep pace with the needs of developments and growth.

“The wealth of any developed nation is its own educated citizens: progress of people and nations is measured by their level of education and its extent of dissemination among them.” (The late Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan Al Nahyan, May he rest in peace).

The educational system in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi includes three major divisions, namely “general education, technical education, and higher education”. This report approaches the statistics of education for the period 2010-2011 to 2013-14. It starts with a brief overview of the most important observations drawn from analysis of statistics relating to the education sector, including schools, classrooms, pupils, and the total and net school enrollment, student promotion to the secondary stage, special education or special needs education, pupils who enrolled at the Institute of Applied Technology, the teaching staff, higher education, adult education, eradication of illiteracy, learning attainment, and illiteracy indicators. In this year report, a set of indicators were added and are related to the Emiratization of the education sector, particularly the school education sector, which would serve the decision-makers and those interested in this matter or devoted thereto.

The report contains a set of detailed statistics tables for those who wish to obtain the figures related to any subject. Some short time series were also drawn up so as to give the reader a comprehensive view on the progress and development over the years. The explanatory notes contained at the end of this report have also contained an explanation to the main terms and technical concepts used in the report, which will give the readers a clear and unequivocal image that triggers no controversial about the meaning of these terms and concepts.

Abu Dhabi Education Council, the Institute of Applied Technology, the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, United Arab Emirates University, Zayed University, and the Higher Colleges of Technology are the main sources for these statistics. In this regard, Statistics Centre - Abu Dhabi extends its thanks to all of them for their cooperation and role in the production and provision of reliable and up-to-date data.

## Executive Summary

**Government schools are more numerous than private schools and have fewer pupils.** Government schools in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi represent 58.0% of the total number of schools in the Emirate. They comprise 36.2% of the total number of classrooms and contain 37.0% of the total number of Abu Dhabi pupils.

**Citizen pupils represent less than half the total number of pupils in the Emirate.** The number of citizen pupils in all stages of education has reached 149,722, making up 43.9% of the total number of pupils in the Emirate.

**There are more male pupils in school education than female pupils.** The number of male pupils has reached 174,222, making up 51.1% of the total number of the school education pupils.

**There are more female pupils in government schools than in private schools.** Female pupils make up the greatest percentage of the total number of pupils in government schools. The proportion of female pupils to male pupils has reached 108.7 per each 100, yet this proportion decreases to 88.8 per each 100 in private schools.

**The average number of pupils per teacher in government schools is less than in private schools.** The average number of pupils per teacher in government schools is 11.5 compared to 17.2 in private schools.

**The Emiratization rate in the government education sector is higher than in the private sector, with more females than males in terms of Emiratization.** The Emiratization rate in education in all educational, administrative, and technical positions/jobs in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi has reached 19.1%, where the citizens make up 44.8% of the total number of government education sector workers while the rate in the private education sector is only 1.1%.

- The Emiratization rate in the positions assumed by the teaching staff is 37.7% in the government education sector against 0.5% in the private education sector.
- The Emiratization rate in the positions assumed by the administrative and technical staff is 78.5% in the government education sector against 2.2% in the private education sector.
- Citizen females make up 85.8% of females in the administrative and technical positions in the government education sector against 63.5% for males in the same sector.
- Citizen female teachers make up 48.2% of the total number of female teachers in the government education sector against only 14% male teachers in the same sector.

**The majority of pupils enrolled at the higher education institutions are UAE citizens, with more female than male pupils.** The citizen pupils make up 77.1% of the total number of pupils enrolled at the higher education institutions, and the citizen female pupils make up 63.1% of the total number of citizen pupils.

## Key Points

### Schools

Distinguished education systems depend largely on working through safe and attractive institutions and facilities specially designed for the purposes of education and observing the environmental conditions and standards, in addition to playing an effective role in serving the surrounding community.

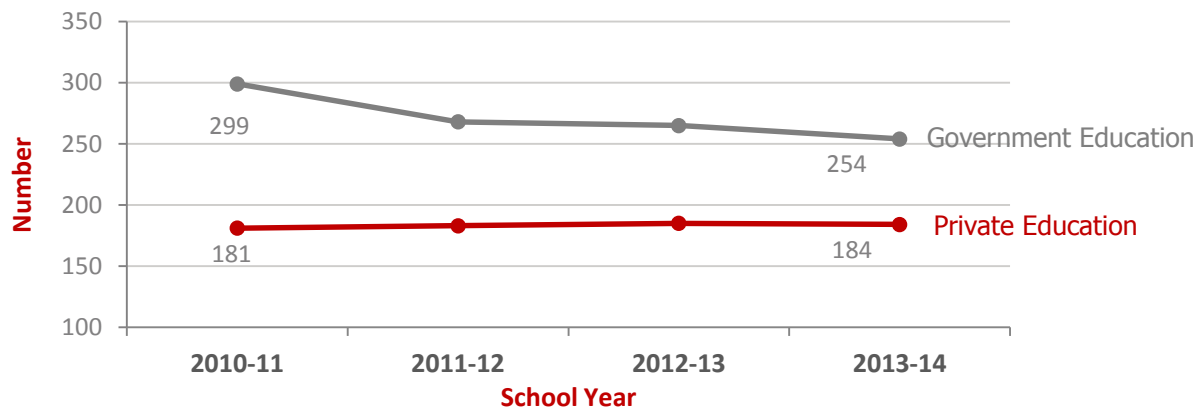
The Emirate of Abu Dhabi seeks to provide a distinctive educational and learning environment by providing universally designed and high capacity schools that would promote the level of the educational process. It is worth mentioning that Abu Dhabi Education Council has launched in 2008 the “Future Schools Project”, which aims at changing the entire educational process in the Emirate. Abu Dhabi Education Council has adopted a master plan to identify the gaps between “demand and supply” in government and private schools in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi so as to make it proportional to the population growth in different areas of the Emirate. The Council also seeks to replace the existing schools with schools that will be built according to the new design standards.

The new schools shall serve as places for promotion of the UAE culture and traditions and focus on communication with the surrounding local communities owing to their being multifunctional resources that encourage parents, families, and the community to participate in the educational process. These schools shall provide high quality education through the use of methods and application of techniques which are consistent with the aspirations of the Emirate of Abu Dhabi and its future generations.

The number of schools in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi was 438 in the school year 2013-14 spread over the three regions of the Emirate as follows: 227 schools in Abu Dhabi region, 168 in Al Ain region, and 43 in Al Gharbia.

By providing buildings and facilities with distinguished standards, Abu Dhabi Education Council aims to provide a comprehensive and effective educational system that contributes to educating and teaching pupils as a driving force that will help the Emirate of Abu Dhabi realize its goal of achieve economic diversity and growth. The number of schools in government education has dropped from 299 schools in the school year 2010-11 to 254 in the school year 2013-14, while the number of schools in private education has increased from 181 schools in the school year 2010-2011 to 184 in the school year 2013- 14. The distribution of schools in the school year 2013-14 was as follows by educational stage: 54 kindergartens, 64 schools for cycle 1, 41 schools for cycle 2, and 27 secondary schools, as well as 252 multi-stage schools.

### Classrooms

The newly designed classrooms serve as an environment that encourages the diversity of educational activities and plays their role in the process of promoting and enhancing learning, cooperation, and teamwork.

The total number of classrooms has increased across the Emirate of Abu Dhabi and jumped from 13,528 in the school year 2010-11 to 14,899 in the school year 2013-14, with an increase of 10.1% over that period.

The increase in the total number of classrooms accounts for the increase in the number of classrooms in the private education, this number has significantly increased by 20.1% from the school year 2010-11 to the school year 2013-14, while the number of classrooms in government education has decreased in the same period by 3.9%, falling to 5,399 classrooms.

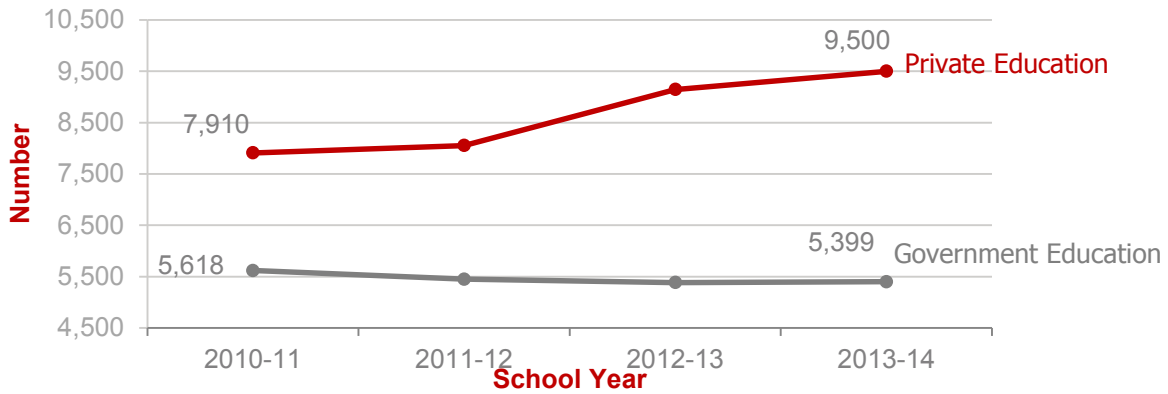
The pattern of decrease and increase in the number of classrooms in government and private education sectors applies to all the regions of the Emirate of Abu Dhabi during the same period. The percentages of the total number of classrooms in the regions of Abu Dhabi, Al Ain and Al Gharbia has been 58.7%, 35.0% and 6.2% respectively during the school year 2013-14.

Classrooms are distributed according to the educational stage as follows: 2,493 classrooms for kindergarten, 6,065 classrooms for cycle 1, 3,869 classrooms for cycle 2, and 2,472 classrooms for the secondary school stage.

The average number of pupils per classroom in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi during the school year 2013-14 was 22.9 pupils while this average was 23.8 in Abu Dhabi region, 21.8 in Al Ain region and 20.1 in Al Gharbia. At the level of the sector, the average number of pupils per classroom in government schools was more than it is in private schools, with 23.4 in government schools against 22.6 in private schools.

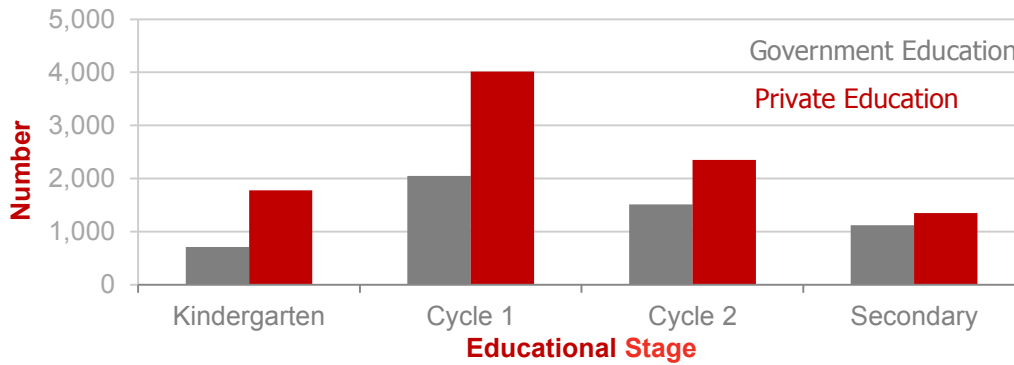
At the level of the education stage, the government education sector witnessed an increase in the average number of pupils per classroom in the secondary education stage as it jumped from 21.9 in the school year 2010-11 to 23.1 in the school year 2013-14. The average number of teachers per classroom for the school year 2013-14 was 1.6, distributed as follows: 1.5 in the Abu Dhabi region, 1.6 in Al Ain region, and 1.8 in Al Gharbia.

**Figure 2: Classrooms by Sector, 2010-11 to 2013-14**



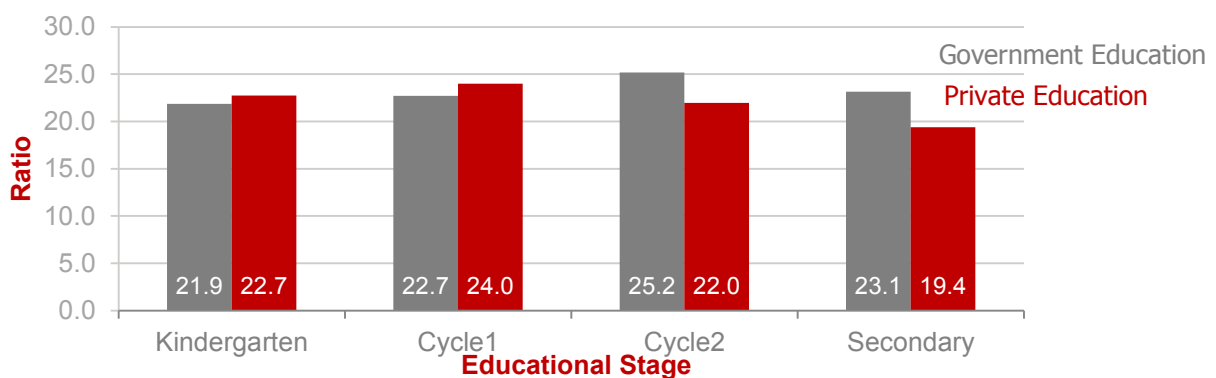

## Pupils

The new scholastic model is deemed to be the foundation of the developed educational system in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi. This model is premised and centered on the student and the development of his capabilities in both Arabic and English, critical thinking, and national identity. The implementation of the new scholastic model started in 2010 by applying it in all the classrooms of kindergarten level and grades 1 to 3 of primary education in government schools in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi.

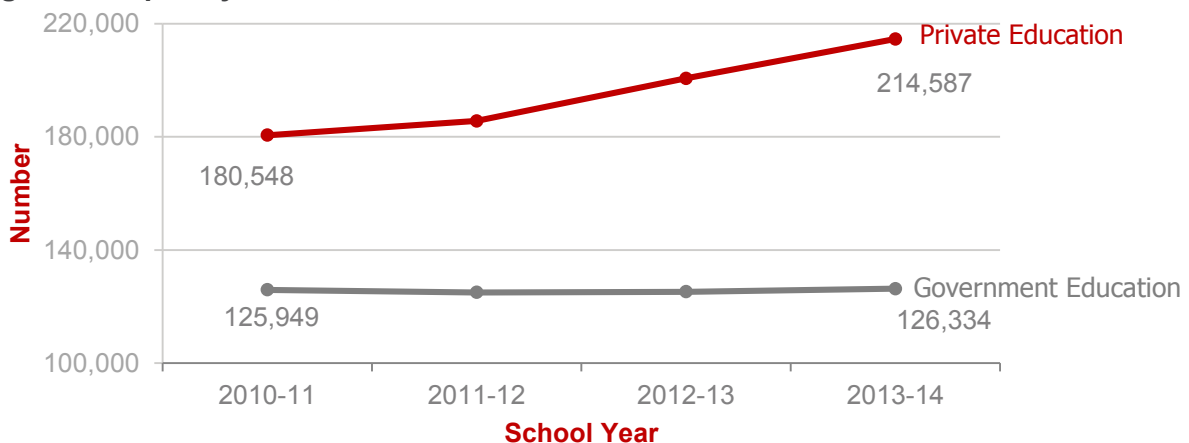
The number of pupils enrolled in all educational stages has increased from 306,497 in the school year 2010-11 to 340,974 in the school year 2013-14, with an increase by 11.2% over the whole period.

The pattern of increase in the number of pupils applies to all the regions of the Emirate as follows:

- Abu Dhabi region: the number of pupils increased from 184,165 in the school year 2010-11 to 208,630 in 2013-14, an increase by 13.3%.
- Al Ain region: the number of pupils increased from 105,358 in the school year 2010-11 to 113,625 in 2013-14, an increase by 7.8%.
- Al Gharbia: the number of pupils increased from 16,974 in the school year 2010-11 to 18,719 in 2013-14, an increase by 10.3%.

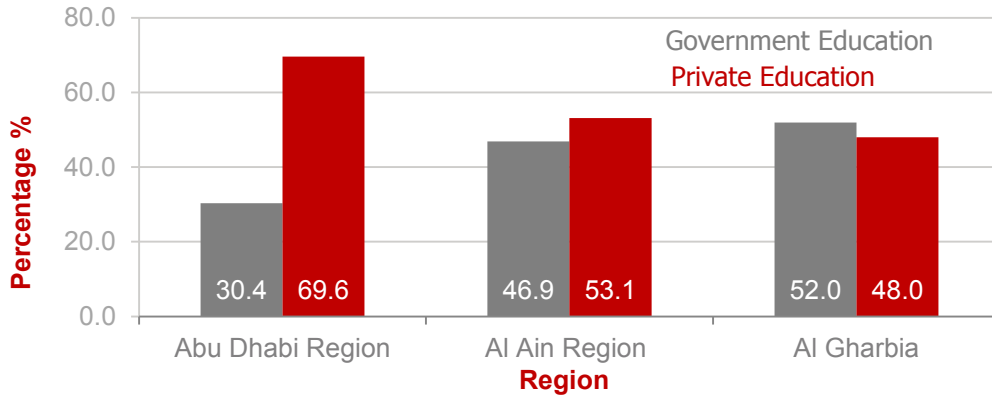
At the level of the sector, no remarkable increase was seen in the number of pupils enrolling in the government education for the period 2010-11 to 2013-14. The number of pupils who enrolled in the government education has increased from 125,949 in the school year 2010-11 to just 126,216 in the school year 2013-14, an increase by 1% over that period. The growth in the number of pupils enrolling at private schools reached 18.9% over the same period, and the percentage of pupils who enrolled in private schools has jumped from 58.9% in the school year 2010-11 to 63.0% in the school year 2013-14.

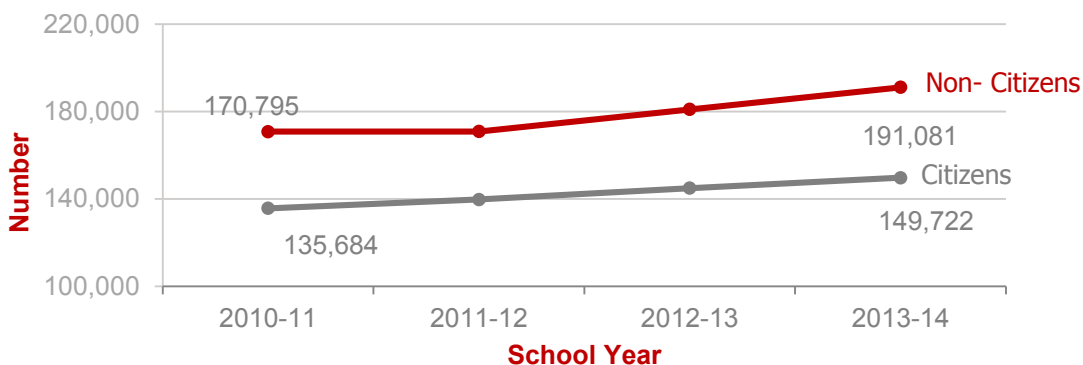
The number of citizen pupils represents less than half of the overall pupils in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi. The number of citizen pupils enrolled at all stages of education till the secondary stage has reached 149,722, making up 43.9% of the total number of pupils in the Emirate.

Their distribution by region in the school year 2013-14 was as follows:

- 54.2% pupils enrolled in Abu Dhabi region, (with an increase by 12.6% compared to the school year 2010-11).
- 40.7% pupils enrolled in Al Ain region, (with an increase by 8.7% compared to the school year 2010-11).
- 5.1% pupils enrolled in Al Gharbia, (with an increase by 1.5% compared to the school year 2010-11).

In general, the data indicates that most of the citizen pupils are in the government education, as the percentage of citizen pupils enrolled in government education has reached 65.3% in the school year 2013-14. When compared to the previous years, the rates show a decrease in the percentage of citizen pupils enrolled in government education from 68.1% in the school year 2010-11 to 65.3% in the school year 2013-14. Citizen pupils have increasingly been attracted to private schools, making the percentage jump from 31.9% in the school year 2010-11 to 34.7% in the school year 2013-14.

The ratio of citizen pupils per 100 non-citizen pupils has reached 78.3 during the school year 2013-14. This rate has decreased from 79.4 in the school year 2010-11 to 78.3 in the school year 2013-14, where the ratio of citizen pupils per 100 non-citizen pupils in government schools was as follows:

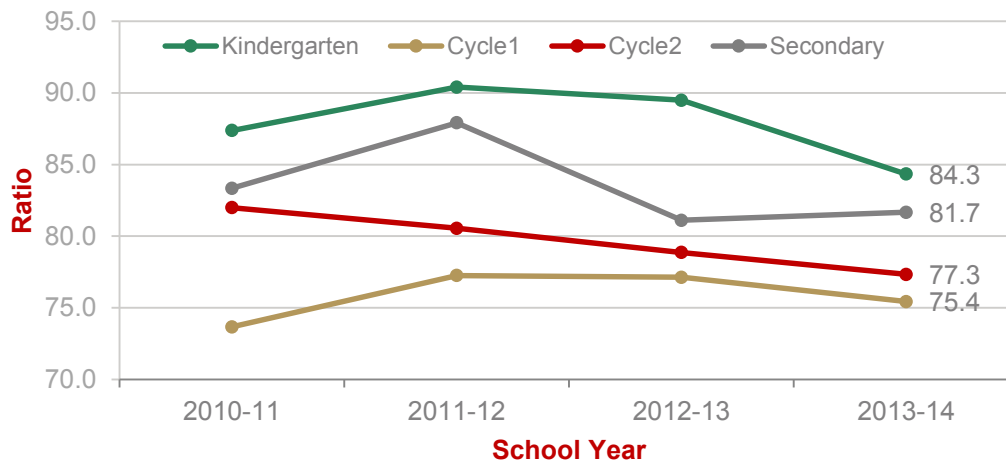
- 344.1 citizen pupils per 100 non-citizen pupils in government schools.
- 31.9 citizen pupils per 100 non-citizen pupils in private schools.

When comparing the ratio of female citizen pupils per 100 female non-citizen pupils, we see that the ratio of citizen pupils per 100 non-citizen pupils is more than in males in the school year 2013-14: the figures are as follows:

- 80.3 female citizen pupils per 100 female non-citizen pupils compared to 76.4 in males.

Figure 8 shows the ratio of citizen pupils per 100 non-citizen pupils by educational stage during the past four years.

**Figure 8: Ratio of Citizen Pupils per 100 Non-Citizen Pupils by Educational Stage, from 2010-11 to 2013-14**



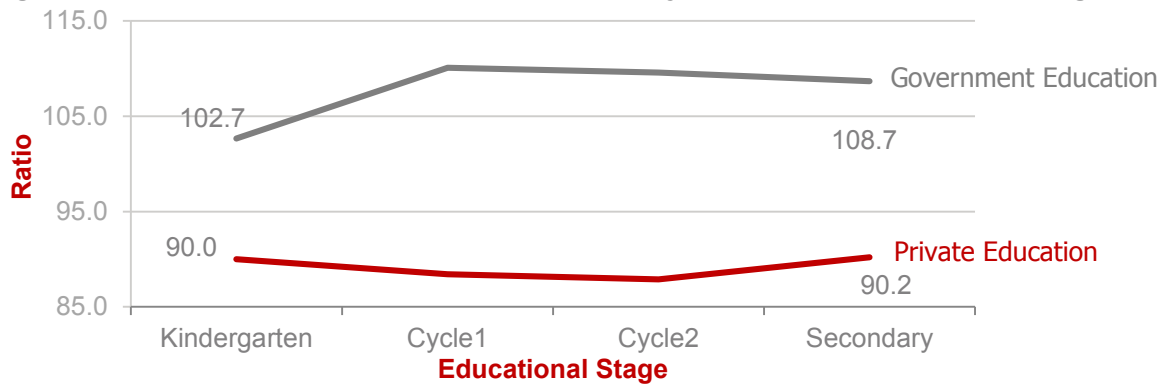

Male pupils represented 51.1% of the total number of pupils enrolled in government schools, where the number of male pupils amounted to 174,222 in the school year 2013-14, with an increase by 11.3% compared to the school year 2010-11. The school year 2013-14 has also witnessed an increase in the number of female pupils by 11.2%, as the number of female pupils has increased from 150,010 in the school year 2010-11 to 166,752 in the school year 2013-14.

At the level of the sector, the female pupils represented the biggest percentage of pupils enrolled in government schools in the school years 2013-14, where the percentage of female pupils to each 100 male pupils has reached 95.7 in all stages of education in the Emirate and 108.7 female student per each 100 male pupils in government schools but it has decreased to 88.8 in private schools.

The highest rate of enrollment of female pupils in government schools in the school year 2013-14 was in the cycle 1, where the rate of female pupils reached 110.1 per each 100 male pupils while the highest rate of female pupils in private schools was in the secondary stage at 90.2 female pupils per each 100 male pupils.

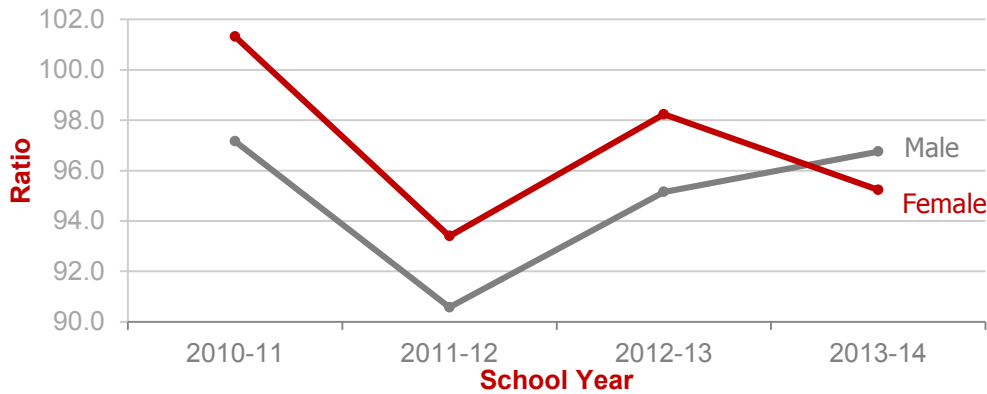
The student distribution by educational stage in the school year 2013-14 was as follows:

- 56,061 pupils enrolled in kindergartens, with an increase by 18.9% compared to what it was in the school year 2010-11.
- 142,949 pupils enrolled in the cycle 1, with an increase by 12.6% compared to what it was in the school year 2010-11.
- 89,809 pupils enrolled in the cycle 2, with an increase by 9% compared to what it was in the school year 2010-11.
- 52,155 pupils enrolled in the secondary stage, with an increase by 4.3% compared to what it was in the school year 2010-11.

The gross enrollment ratio reflects the overall level of participation in the various education stages, where in the school year 2013-14 the gross enrollment ratio in the cycle 1 has reached 104.1, and 98.6 and 88.1 in cycle 2 and in the secondary stage respectively, while the net enrollment ratio has reached its highest rates in the cycle 1 when it has reached 80 in males, 81.4 in females, and 80.7 in both genders.

The males have higher rates than females in progression to secondary education stages as the progression ratios in the school year 2013-14 has reached 96.8% for males, 95.2% for females, and 96% for both of them. In the school year 2013-14 the number of pupils progressing to the secondary education stage has amounted to 18,217 pupils, marking an increase by 477 pupils compared to the previous year 2012-13, a 2.7% increase.

### Special Needs

Abu Dhabi Education Council adopts a special policy for Special Needs Education aimed at ensuring that pupils with special needs including the talented and outstanding ones do use their inherent capabilities and potentials through a supporting and encouraging educational environment.

The number of schools providing special education in the government education sector has jumped from 145 in the school year 2010-11 to 202 in the school year 2012-13 , an increase by 39.3%.

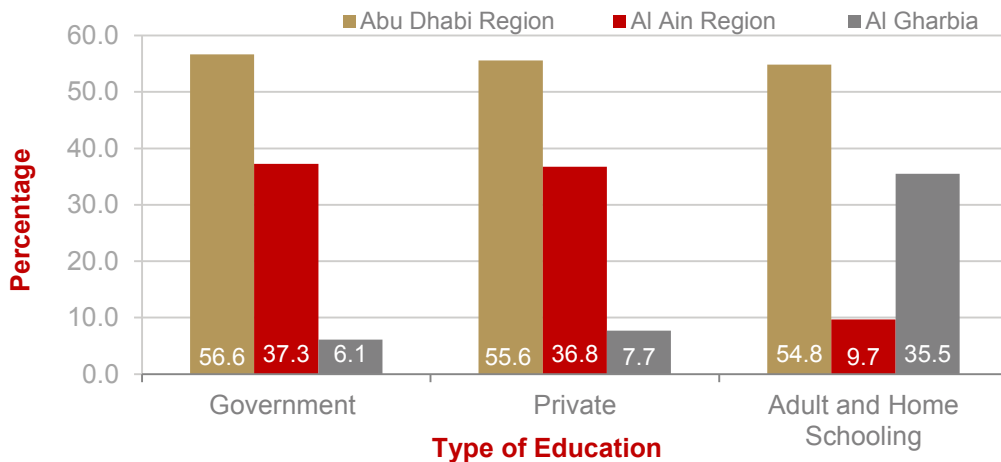
Al Ain Region has 55% of these schools while the shares of Abu Dhabi Region and Al Gharbia were respectively 36.6% and 8.4%.

The integration of pupils with special needs into school life was not limited to government schools. The school year 2013-14 data has included the data of private schools and adult education too, where the number of pupils with special needs integrated into school life has generally increased by 103.8% in the school year 2013-14 from where it was in the school year 2010-11. The pupils with special needs are distributed by type of education in the following pattern:

- 97.6% of the pupils with special needs are enrolled in government education.
- 1.6% of the pupils with special needs are enrolled in private education.
- 0.8% of the pupils with special needs are enrolled at adult education.

The percentage increase in government education in the school year 2013-14 was 98.8% compared to the school year 2010-11.

The data relating to special need pupils for the school year 2013-14 indicates that most of the pupils have presented some learning difficulties where the percentages in the regions of Abu Dhabi, Al Ain and Al Gharbia were respectively 57.1%, 66.7%, and 69.9%. The language and speaking disorders came second and were respectively 17.8%, 4.0%, and 3.8% in the regions of Abu Dhabi, Al Ain, and Al Gharbia.

The number of special education teachers and specialists went up from 231 in the school year 2010-11 to 264 in the school year 2012-13. The specialists of vocalization and language went up from 5 in the school year 2010-11 to 11 in the school year 2012-13.

**Teachers, Administrators and Technicians**

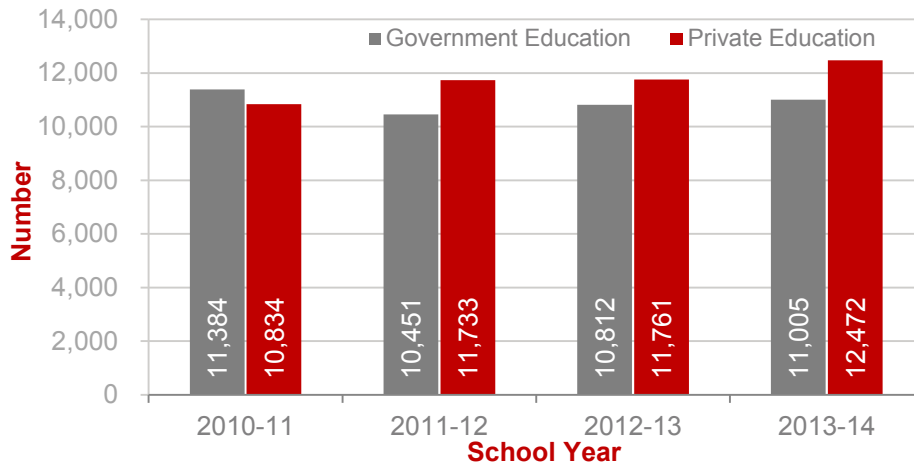
The Emirate of Abu Dhabi seeks to be a unique and vital place for the practice of the education profession, where the teacher plays a prominent role in the provision of a positive school environment that promotes learning.

The total number of teachers went up from 22,218 in the school year 2010-11 to 23,477 in the school year 2013-14, an increase by 5.7% and an average increase by 1.4% per year over the whole period.

The distribution by sector was as follows:

- The total number of teachers in the government education has reached 11,005 in the school year 2013-14, with a decrease by 3.3% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- The total number of teachers in the private education has reached 12,472 in the school year 2013-14, with an increase by 15.1% compared to the school year 2010-11.

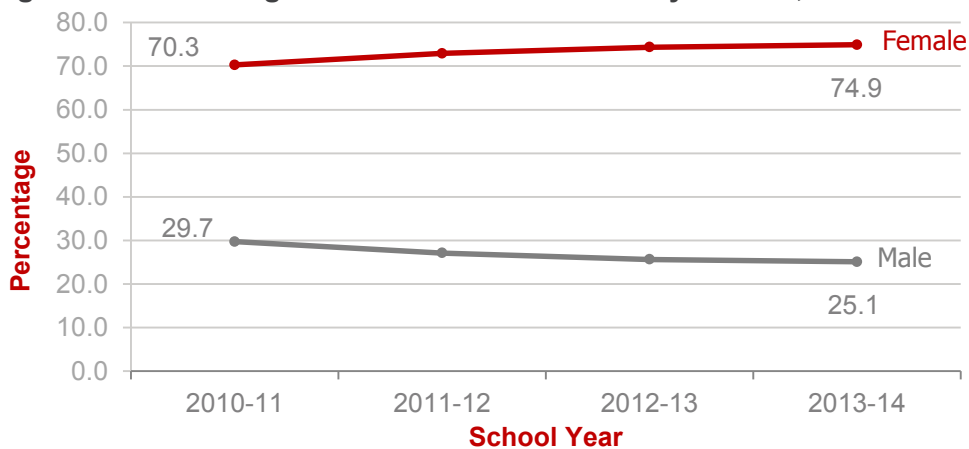
**Figure 12: Teachers by Sector, 2010-11 to 2013-14**

At the level of gender, female teachers outnumbered the male teachers in education during the school year 2013-14, where the female teachers represented 74.9% of the total number of teachers in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi, with a percentage of 69.4% in government schools against 79.7% in private schools.

**Figure 13: Percentage Distribution of Teachers by Gender, 2013-2014**

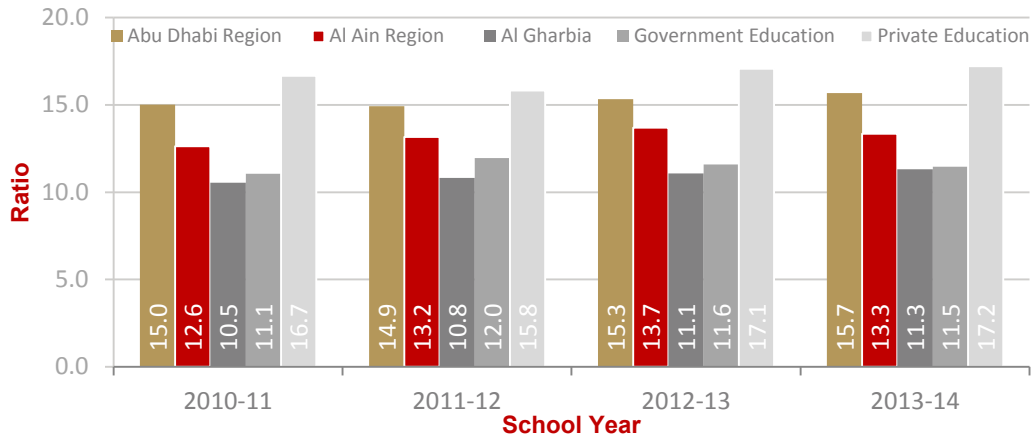

The data showed that the average number of pupils per teacher in the school year 2013-14 was 14.5 pupils per teacher, with 15.7 in Abu Dhabi Region, 13.3 in Al Ain Region, and 11.3 in Al Gharbia.

At the sector level, the average number of pupils per teacher in government schools was less than in private schools, where the average number of pupils per teacher in government schools was 11.5 while this average in private schools was 17.2.

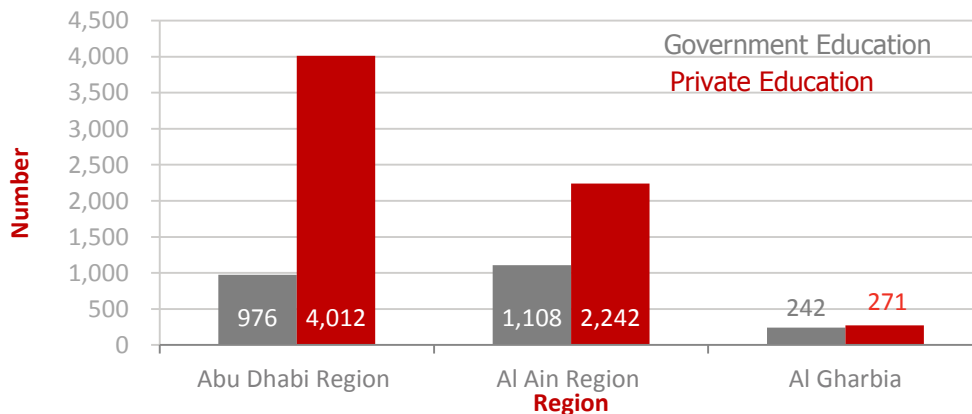
**Figure 14: Pupils per Teacher by Region and Sector, 2010-11 to 2013-14**

The number of administrative and technical staff increased in the school year 2013-14 compared with school year 2010-11 by 9.2% from 8,107 to 8,851.

### Emiratization in Education

The United Arab Emirates in general and the Government of Abu Dhabi in particular pay special attention to the Emiratization process as a fundamental element of strategic planning that represents a national supreme goal requiring concerted efforts by all bodies in various sectors and is the nation’s legitimate right to regulate and organize the labor market and give priority to their own citizens.



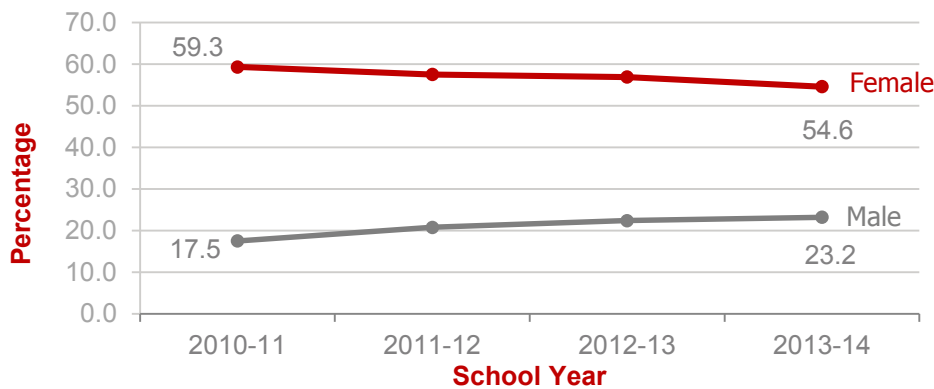
In view of the existing correlation and relevance between education and identity, culture, national belonging, and loyalty, the government pays the Emiratization issue in this sector special interest as an important step towards building the sought-after developmental model and ensuring its sustainability.

The percentage of citizens of the education sector manpower in all teaching, administrative, and technical positions in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi has reached 19.1% in the school year 2013-14, where the citizens represented 44.8% of the total number of the personnel working in government schools against 1.1% in private schools.

The participation of citizens in teaching, administrative, and technical positions in education by sector and gender in the school year 2013-14 was as follows:

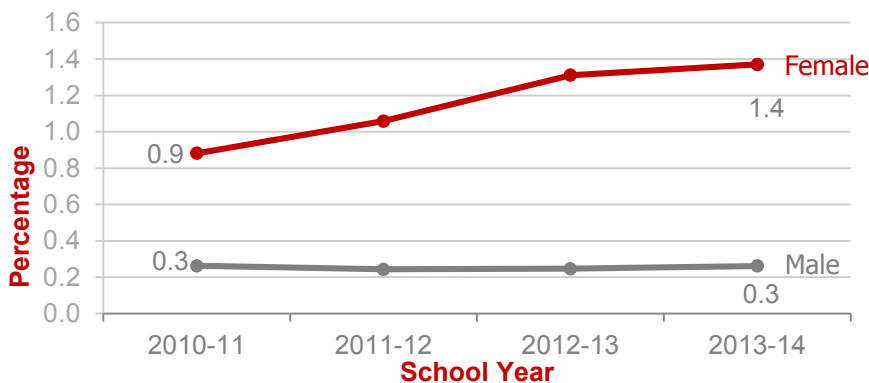
- The share of citizen males was 23.3% of the total number of males working in the government education sector against 0.3% in the private education sector.
- The share of citizen females was 54.6% of the total number of females working in the government education sector against 1.4% in the private education sector.

**Figure 17: Percentage of Emiratization in Government Education by Gender, 2010-11 to 2013-14**



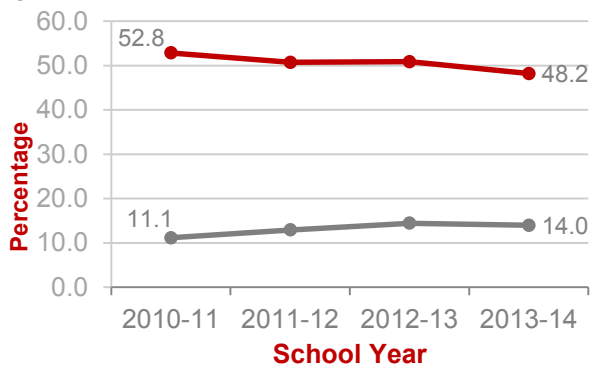

At the level of teaching jobs, the citizen teachers represented 17.9% of the total number of teachers assuming teaching jobs in the school year 2013-14, while the percentage of citizens assuming administrative and technical positions was 22.3% in the same school year.

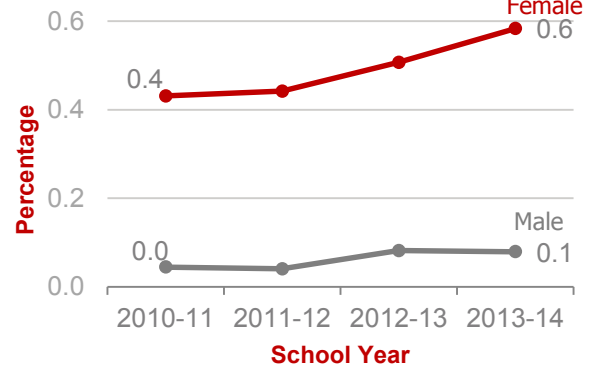
### Teaching Staff

The participation of citizens in government education is more than in the private sector: the citizens represent 37.7% of the total number of teachers in government education while they represent only 0.5% in private education in the school year 2013-14.

**Figure 18: Percentage of Emiratization in Teaching Staff in Government Education by Gender, 2010-11 to 2013-14**



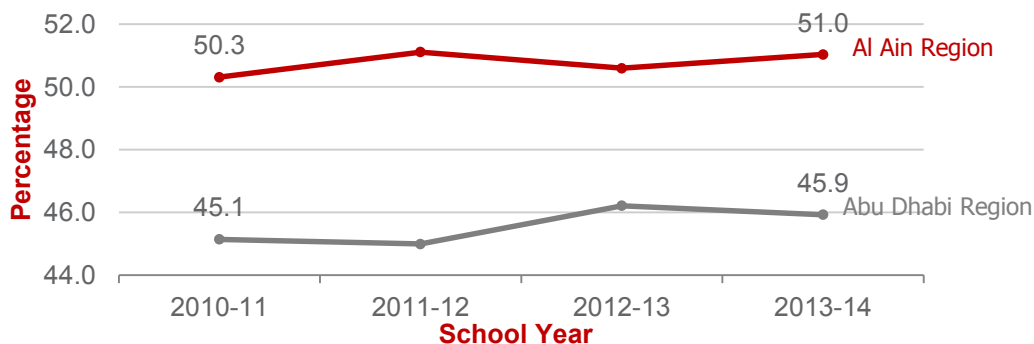
**Figure 19: Percentage of Emiratization in Teaching Staff in Private Education by Gender, 2010-11 to 2013-14**

The government education data shows that Al Ain Region is has the highest rate of citizen teachers, having marked 51.0% in the school year 2013-14, followed by Abu Dhabi Region by 45.9% while this percentage stayed at 3% in Al Gharbia.

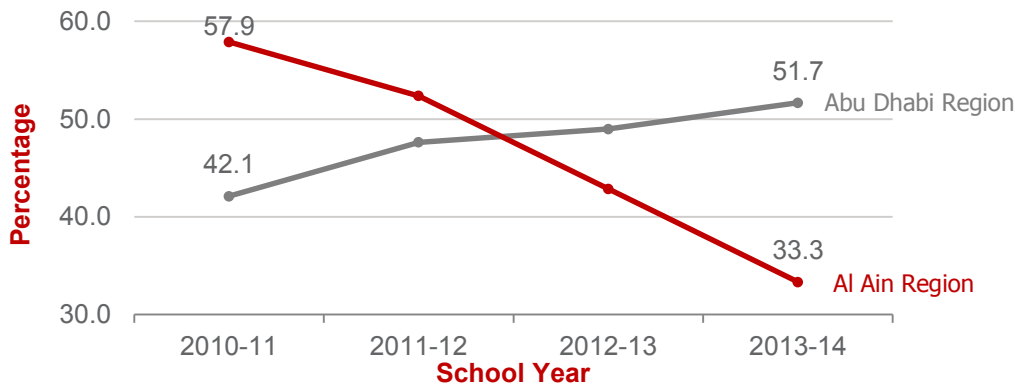
**Figure 20: Percentage Distribution of Emirati Teachers in Government Education by Region, 2010-11 to 2013-14**

The participation of citizen female teachers was higher than the participation of citizen male teachers, as they represented 63.4% of the total number of teachers working in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi while the percentage of citizen male teachers was only 2%. The Emiratization rate has reached 21.3% for female teachers against 8.0% for male teachers, and according to the education sector the rate of Emiratization in females in the government sector has reached 48.2% while it remained at 0.6% in the private sector.

The distribution of citizen female teachers in government education by region in the school year 2013-14 came as follows:

- 44.9% of citizen female teachers in Abu Dhabi Region, with an increase by 0.5% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 51.8% of citizen female teachers in Al Ain Region, with an increase by 0.2% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 3.3% of citizen female teachers in Al Gharbia, with a decrease by 34.0% compared to the school year 2010-11.

On the other hand, the distribution of citizen female teachers in private education by region in the school year 2013-14 came as follows:

- 50.0% of citizen female teachers in Abu Dhabi region, with an increase by 93.8% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 34.5% of citizen female teachers in Al Ain region, with a decrease by 9.1% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 15.5% of citizen female teachers in Al Gharbia.

The distribution of citizen male teachers by school in government education by region in the school year 2013-14 came as follows:

- 546 citizen male teachers in kindergartens, with an increase by 28.5% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 1259 citizenmale teachers in the schools of cycle 1, with a decrease by 14.2% compared to the school year 2010-11.

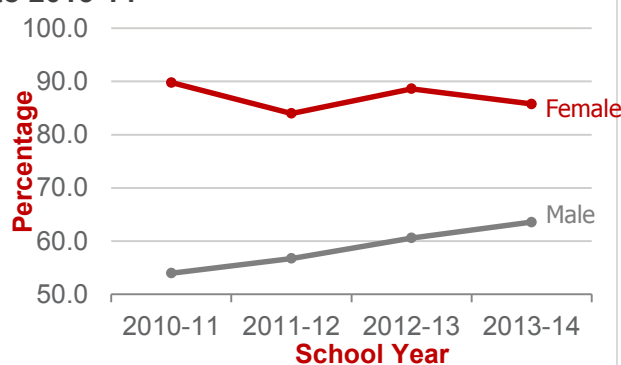
- 889 citizen male teachers in the schools of cycle2, with a decrease by 6.0% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 508 citizen male teachers in secondary schools, with a decrease by 26.8% compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 948 citizen male teachers in multistage schools, with an increase by 42.5% compared to the school year 2010-11.

When comparing the data of citizen teachers in private schools by school, region, and gender, the data of Abu Dhabi Region showed that the citizen male teachers were centred in the schools of cycle 2, with a percentage of 35.5% in the school year 2013-14, while the citizen female teachers concentration was in the schools of cycle 1, with a percentage of 32.4%. The percentage of citizen male teachers went up in multistage schools in Al Ain Region in the past four years to reach 51.0% in the school year 2013-14 compared to only 30.1% in the school year 2010-11, and the same is applicable to Al Gharbia where the number of citizen male teachers went up in multistage schools from 90.9% in the school year 2010-11 to 95.1% in the school year 2013-14.

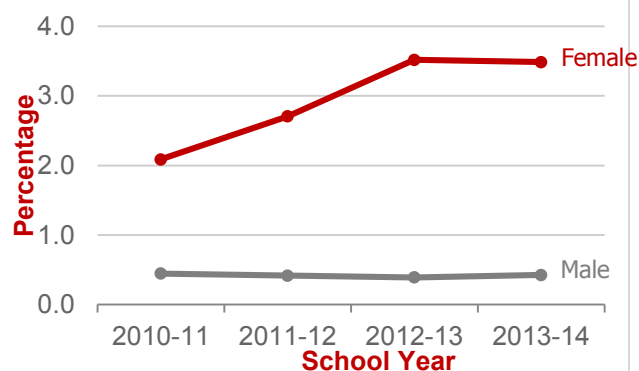
### Administrative and Technical Staff

The rate of Emiratisation in the administrative and technical jobs in government education was greater than in private education, too, where the percentage of citizens assuming these posts in government education has reached 78.5% in the school year 2013-14, while this rate in private education has stayed at 2.2%.

**Figure 23: Percentage of Administrative and Technical Staff Emiratisation in Private Education by Gender, 2010-11 to 2013-14**

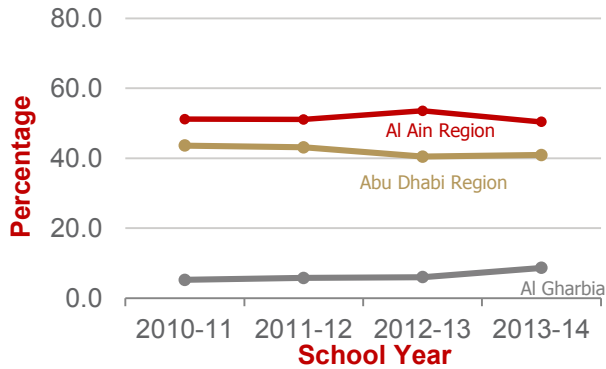

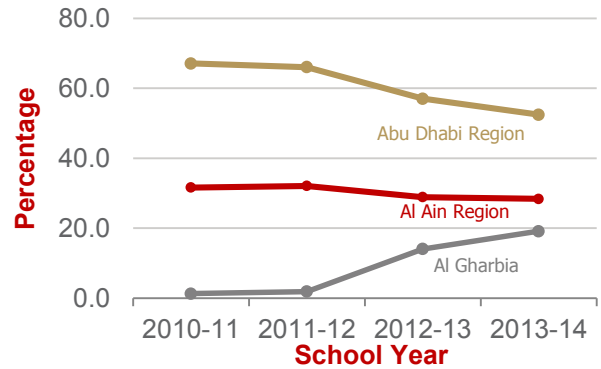
Al Ain Region was the highest in terms of the rate of citizens working in government education in the school year 2013-14 with 50.4% citizens employees compared to 51.2% in the school year 2010-11, followed by Abu Dhabi Region by 40.9% and Al Gharbia by 8.7%.

In the private education these percentages were as follows: in Abu Dhabi Region 52.5%, in Al Ain Region 28.4%, and in Al Gharbia 19.1%.

**Figure 25: Citizens Administrative and Technical Staff in Private Education by Region, 2010-11 to 2013-14**



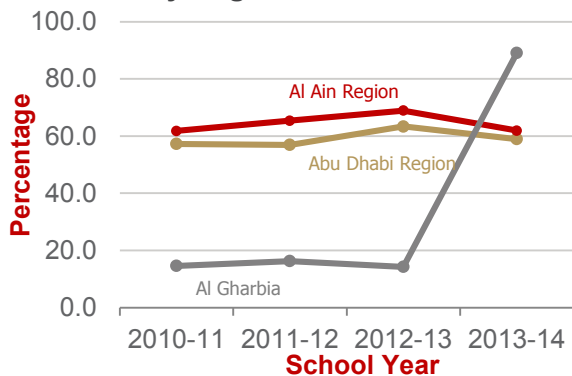

The percentages of participation by gender shows that the citizen females outnumber the citizen males in both the government and private education sectors as the Emiratization rates by gender were as follows:

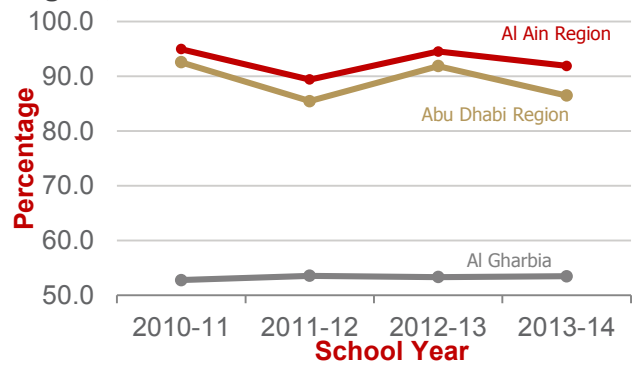
- 13.9% of citizen males from the total number of the Administrative and Technical Staff employees, with an increase of 19.0% in the school year 2013-14 compared to the school year 2010-11.
- 28% is the percentage of citizen females from the total number of the administrative and technical staff employees, with an increase of 5.0% in the school year 2013-14 compared to the school year 2010-11.

At the regions level, Al Gharbia witnessed an increase in rate of Emiratization in males in the government education from 14.6% in the school year 2010-11 to 89.2% in the school year 2013-14.

## Technical Education

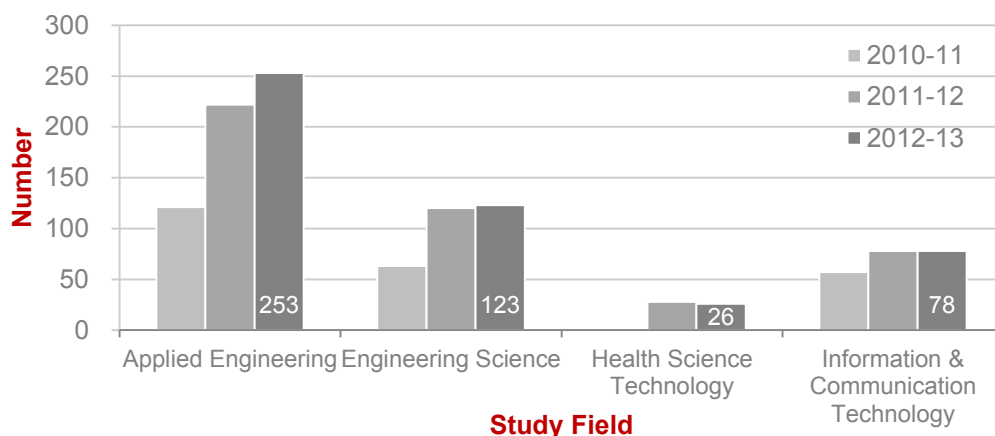
The technical education contributes to the preparation of qualified cadres to meet the needs of the UAE market in technical and vocational areas and actualize the future vision of the Emirate of Abu Dhabi.

The number of citizen pupils who enrolled at the Institute of Applied Technology has jumped from 1196 pupils in the school year 2009-10 to 2,799 pupils in the school year 2012-13, with an increase of 134% over the period and an average annual increase of 32.8% during that period. The rate of citizen female pupils who enrolled at the technical education jumped from 14.8% in the school year 2009-10 to 44.7% in the school year 2012-13.

Similar patterns of increase by region have also been demonstrated as the number of pupils in Abu Dhabi Region went up from 566 to 1,634, with an increase that is equal to three times and in Al Ain Region the number of pupils has increased to the double from 630 to 1,156. The school year 2012-13 witnessed the graduation of 480 pupils, 215 of them were from Abu Dhabi Region and 265 from Al Ain Region.

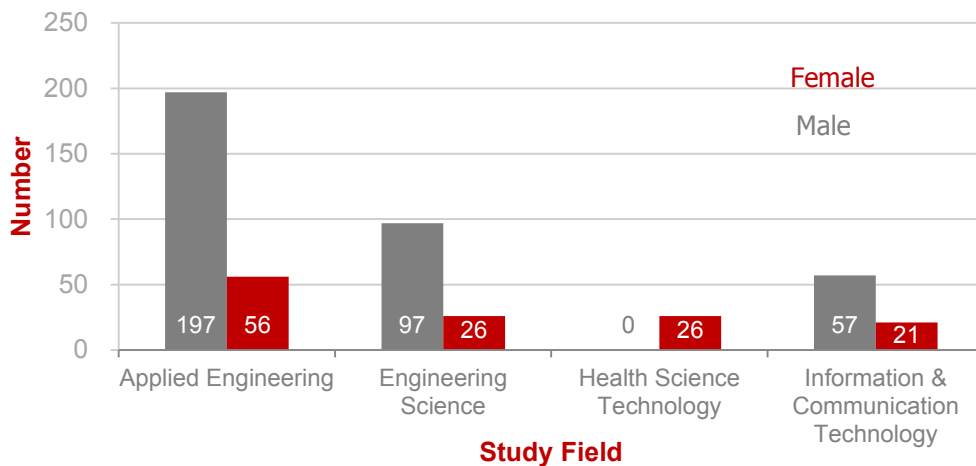
The number of teachers in technical education has increased to 258 in 2012-13 compared to only 87 teachers back in the year 2009-10, realizing an increase of 196.6% during that period. Similar patterns of increase in the number of teachers by gender have also been seen as the number of male teachers has increased from 76 in the school year 2009-10 to 113 in the school year 2012-13, while the number of female teachers has increased from 11 in the school year 2009-10 to 145 in the school year 2012-13.

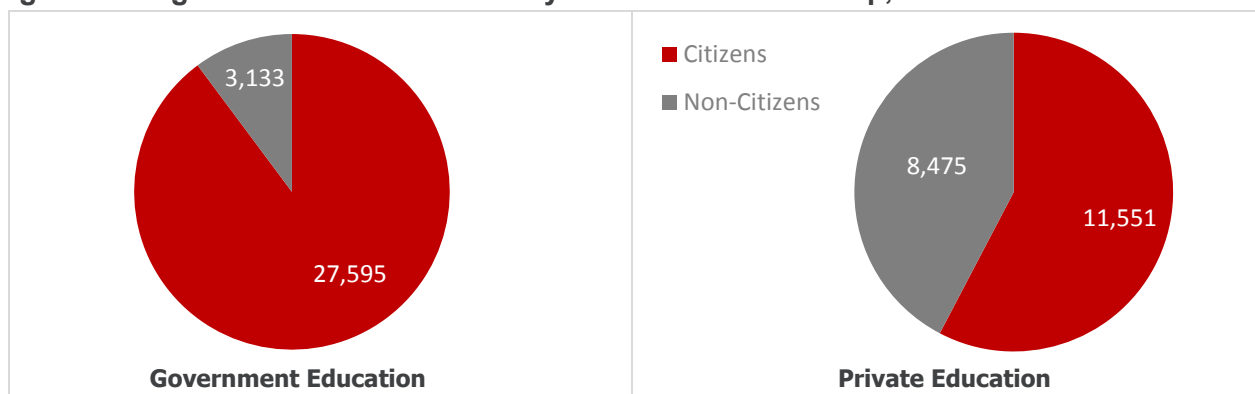
### Higher Education

The number of universities in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi has reached 8 (2 government and 6 private) while the number of other higher education institutions reached 19 (colleges and institutes), one of which is a government institution in the school year 2012-13.

The number of pupils enrolled in higher education institutions of various types has jumped from 40,031 in the school year 2009-10 to 50,754 in the school year 2012-13, an increase by 26.8% over that period. This increase is demonstrated in both sectors as the government education witnessed an increase of enrolled pupils in the school years 2012-13 by 24.4% compared to that of the school year 2009-10, while the number of pupils enrolled at the private education institutions went up by 30.7% over the same period.

The data of the school year 2012-13 shows that the majority of the pupils of higher education were citizens, making up 77.1% of the total number of pupils enrolled at the higher education institutions: the citizen female pupils represented 63.1% of the total number of citizen pupils.

**Figure 30: Higher Education Students by Sector and Citizenship, 2012-13**

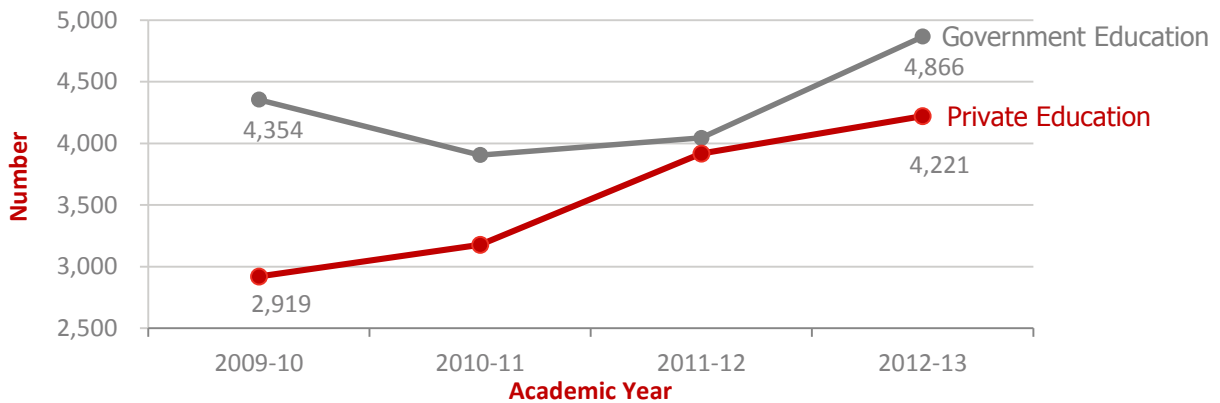

The number of higher education graduates has increased from 6,507 in the school year 2009-10 to 9,087 in the school year 2012-13, a percentage of increase of 39.6% over that period. The number of government education graduates was 4,866 in the school year 2012-13, with a percentage increase of 11.8% compared to that of the school year 2009-10, while the number of graduates in the private education rose from 2,919 in the school year 2009-10 to 4,221 in the school year 2012-13, an increase of 44.6% over that period.

The data relating to graduated pupils for the school year 2012-13 has shown differences in the percentage of graduates by major. The highest percentages of graduates of the United Arab Emirates University were from the Humanities and Social Sciences, and Management and Economics with 25.9% and 20.1% respectively, while the lowest was in Medicine and Health Sciences by 3.0% each. The same was the case for Zayed University and the Higher Colleges of Technology, where the highest rate of graduates was in Business. Of all graduates from the private higher education institutions, the greatest percentage were from Business and Engineering with 30.7% and 10.3% respectively.

### Adult Education

The number of illiteracy eradication, adult education, and home study centres has dropped in Abu Dhabi Region from 114 centres in the school year 2010-11 to 99 in the school year 2013-14. The decrease trend is evident in Abu Dhabi Region and Al Ain Region as the number of centres in Abu Dhabi Region as dropped from 30 in the school year 2010-11 to 25 centres in the school year 2013-14, and in Al Ain Region the number of centres has dropped from 58 in the school year 2010-11 to 48 centres in the school year 2013-14.

The number of pupils enrolled at the illiteracy eradication, adult education, and home study centres has dropped from 15,242 in the school year 2010-11 to 11,031 in the school year 2013-14, some 7.6% decrease. The citizens represent the highest percentage of people enrolled at the illiteracy eradication, adult education, and home study centres, making 78.3% of the total number of enrolled pupils. 65.8% of the pupils enrolled at the illiteracy eradication, adult



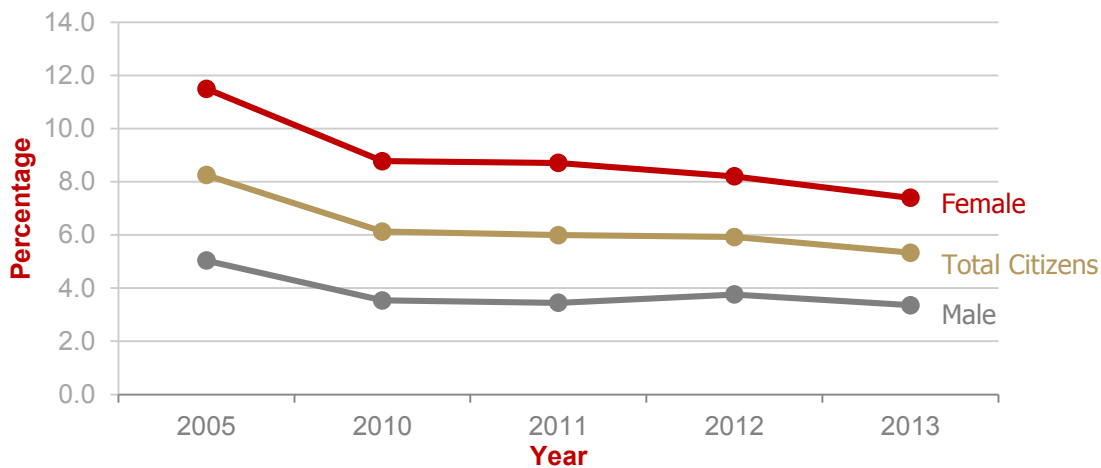
education, and home study centres are males. The number of teachers working for the illiteracy eradication, adult education, and home study centres is 452; seven percent of them were Emiratis.

### Illiteracy

The estimate, for the year 2013 has shown a decrease in the illiteracy rates among the population aged 10 years and older: the rates dropped from 12.6% in 2005 to 7.2% in 2013. The illiteracy rates in citizens (10 years and older) was lower than for non-citizens. The illiteracy rate for citizen females was higher than for citizen males: the illiteracy rate for citizen males (10 year and older) was 5.3% against 7.5% for non-citizens. The illiteracy rate for citizen females, which is 7.4%, is higher than the illiteracy rate in citizen males, which is 3.4%.

The illiteracy rate in citizen youths aged (15-24 ears) in 2013 was very low as it was only 0.5% in citizen males and 6.4% in citizen females.

## **Explanatory Notes**

### **Glossary**

This report contains technical terms that should be known when analyzing the statistics of the educational sector in the Emirate of Abu Dhabi, which include the following terms:

#### **Gross Enrollment Ratio**

The number of pupils, regardless of age enrolled in a particular education stage / the number of population in that stage's official age group x 100.

#### **Net Enrollment Ratio**

This is the number of enrolled pupils in the official age range of a particular education stage (Kindergarten from age 4 to 5 years, Cycle1 from age 6 to 10 years, Cycle2 from age 11 to 14 years, Secondary from age 15 to 17 years) / the number of population in that stage's official age group x 100.

#### **School Year**

This is the period of time in which a student completes 1 level of education. In the UAE the school year usually starts in September of a year and ends in June of the next year. For example, the 2013-14 school year started in September 2013 and ended in June 2014.

#### **Data Source**

Data are obtained from Abu Dhabi Education Council, Institute of Applied Technology, Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, UAE University, Zayed University and Higher Colleges of Technology. The data are processed and passed to Statistic Centre – Abu Dhabi for further editing and compilation.

## **Technical Notes**

Data of Abu Dhabi Education Council (ADEC) refers to 10/7/2014 and were updated on 08/08/2014.

### **Notes on the tables**

The changes available in levels and tables are based on unrounded numbers.
